SOCIETY SPOTLIGHT

The Saint Joseph Society of Lodi, New Jersey

The Saint Joseph Society was officially incorporated on December 7, 1915 by Italian immigrants from various towns in Sicily. These men were devoted to Saint Joseph. Their mission was to have a place of worship in honor of their patron saint to be located in Lodi, NJ.



The founding fathers worked together to build the first Saint Joseph Church in 1917. Each member took out a personal loan to help contribute financially to make their dream a reality. Another amazing act of dedication was that the members themselves performed the actual labor and construction work to erect the church. As Saint Joseph was a carpenter during his life on earth, those men played the role of Saint Joseph in constructing their house of worship.

The society sought to honor their patron saint in several special ways. Importing a tradition from Sicily, the society began to distribute the "pane di San Giuseppe" (Saint Joseph's bread) each year at the time of his feast day, March 19th. To this day, the society distributes the blessed bread to all parishioners at every mass on the weekend closest to March 19th.

Another longstanding tradition observed in Sicily to celebrate the feast day of Saint Joseph is "La Tavolata di San Giuseppe" (the Saint Joseph "sharing table"). This tradition was established and carried on by the society for many years. For a while, the parish itself sponsored the event. In 2008, the society once again took over the role of organizing the "tavolata" and looks forward to doing so for many years to come.



These were great traditions brought here to America from the old country. However, the members continually sought to do more. They wanted to honor the great Saint Joseph with a procession and outdoor feast. Since it can still be quite cold in March, the society looked to September, when the weather is warmer, and during which the country celebrates Labor Day. This holiday, which provides a day of rest for all laborers, seemed to be the perfect time to commemorate Saint Joseph, the "Patron Saint of Workers". And so, the idea was born to host a feast throughout Labor Day weekend including rides, games, Italian food specialties, and nightly entertainment. The highlight of the feast would be the procession to take place in the afternoon on Labor Day followed by a benediction. Over a century later, this is still the case. Although the town of Lodi has changed over the years, and is now home to many different ethnic groups, the annual feast is still a great success and a well-known event in Northern New Jersey.

Each year in the early months of Spring, the members of the society would go from house to house in Lodi to spread the word about the upcoming Saint Joseph Feast, asking for donations and inviting the community to attend the feast in September. This tradition lasted until the 1980's. During the feast itself, on Saturday, Sunday, and Monday mornings, the society members would again take to the streets of Lodi and surrounding towns such as Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights. Forming three separate groups, they would spread out and march through the streets, accompanied by traditional Italian feast bands. Each group would carry a "stendardo" (banner) of Saint Joseph upon which the faithful would pin their money

offerings in honor of the saint. The doorbell at every house would be rung and the band would play favorite songs such as "Mamma", "Oh Marie", and "Santa Lucia".

From the 1940's through the 1960's, the Saint Joseph Society had close to 100 members. However, as time passed on, so did many of the members pass on to their reward in heaven. During the early years, all society meetings were conducted in the Italian language. This held true until the 1970's at which point English began to be used. Since membership had decreased, it became difficult for the society to oversee all aspects of the feast without help. parish became responsible for organizing the rides, games, and food. The society continued provide the to nightly entertainment, as well as carrying on the traditional collections throughout the weekend and coordinating the beautiful procession, still the highlight of the feast!

Today, the society consists of over 30 members. Monthly meetings are conducted in both English and Italian to accommodate all members. Looking to the future, the society prays that, through the intercession of Saint Joseph, it will grow in strength and numbers so that it may continue its important work of faith and devotion. 


October 2023
Eucharistic Rosary Congress












October 2023 Monthly Meeting

UNA RICETTA SICILIANA PER LA TAVOLA DI SAN GIUSEPPE

U Maccu i San Giuseppe

A thick, creamy, fava bean soup, flavored with fennel and mint, and served in honor of St. Joseph.

Ingredients


- 1 kg of already shelled fava beans (about 2.2 lbs)
- 3 spring onions (scallions)
- 1 tuft of wild fennel fronds (you can substitute with fennel seeds)
- 8-10 mint leaves
- Freshly ground black pepper
- Extra Virgin Olive Oil a few tablespoons
- Salt to taste
- 400 g spaghetti broken in pieces (about 14 ounces)
- Ricotta Salata (to grate)

Directions

- Take the wild fennel fronds, wash and dry them and put them in a pot with about 2 liters (about 8.5 cups) of water and boil until cooked.
- 2. Drain and chop finely. Do not discard the water, instead filter it and set it aside.
- 3. Remove the skin from the fava beans (this is perhaps the most tedious job).
- 4. Clean and finely chop the spring onions.
- In a saucepan, brown the spring onions in the EVOO over medium heat. As soon as the onion is golden brown, add the fava beans, salt and stir.
- 6. Brown for a few minutes and add two cups of fennel water (this should cover the fava beans) and continue cooking over low heat, adding the chopped fennel.
- 7. As soon as the fava beans are cooked and a puree has been created (as coarse or as creamy as you like), puree them with a blender and make them into a cream.
- 8. Put the fava bean puree back in the sauce pan on the fire and add one half of the remaining fennel water.
- 9. As soon as it starts to boil, pour in the broken spaghetti and be sure to stir constantly.
- 10. If necessary, during cooking add more of the fennel water until the spaghetti is cooked.
- 11. At the end, add a good grinding of black pepper, the mint leaves and a good grating of ricotta salata (as is found in Catania, Sicily) and serve. This preparation is even better cold! With the remaining maccu you can also make "fried maccu"-a treat for the palate.
